

American & The World in the 20th Century	

Overview: This independent study will examine the connected world of American politics and culture to broader international events and places throughout the 20th century. The readings compiled in this independent study are interested in several questions: How have international events shaped American politics and culture? How have American policies and culture shaped international events? How does our understanding of 20th century American history change when we consider transnational and global influences? Collectively, the readings reveal a deeper trend in scholarship whose authors acknowledge the failure of considering American history with strict borders. Instead, all the readings come to understand that American history is shaped by transnational forces.

Assignments: The student will complete a 600-word review of each reading. The review should examine the readings' arguments, structure, and historiographical significance. Those same reviews should also connect to other scholarship that we will examine throughout the semester (this be expected more-and-more as the student reads more books throughout the course). The review will be due at midnight on the Sunday preceding the week for the *next* reading.
